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## SUPERVISOR DE SAULNIER TO ADDRESS MDPA AT APRIL 16th MEETING

We have just received confirmation that Supervisor Mark De Saulnier has accepted MDPA's offer to address members of the MDPA at the April membership meeting this coming Friday, April 16th. Supervisor De Saulnier will discuss recent changes that he is proposing in the RFPs currently being developed at the county level for plans to redevelop Buchanan Field. Among other things these changes make it clear that Byron is not an appropriate substitute for the current facilities at Concord and would impose the condition that any successful respondent to the RFP would have to demonstrate the ability to build and make operational to FAA standards a new airport providing equal or better facilities to Concord before any move to close the current airport could be considered. This condition is based on the supervisor's rather optimistic interpretation of a letter sent to him by regional officials of the FAA on January 20th expressing the FAA's unwillingness to approve

any plan to close Buchanan Field. One of the sites currently being considered in this role by developers is the Acme Landfill in Martinez, a site previously on the EPA Superfund list.

As reported earlier in the week, Supervisor De Saulnier will also be present at a meeting originally scheduled by Airport Manager Keith Freitas to address issues associated with East Ramp hangar leases Monday night at the East Ramp terminal facility.

This will be the first time that Supervisor De Saulnier has directly addressed the MDPA and as a member of the newly appointed MDPA Political Outreach Committee and your AOPA representative for Buchanan Field, I urge you to come and participate in one or both of these meetings. This is a great opportunity to hear directly from the Supervisor about his various proposals and will afford MDPA members a chance to get a direct response to questions they may have.

So plan to attend this coming Friday night, bring your friends and don't forget to RSVP so we can have plenty of food on hand for Rob

Goldman's Spring barbecue, Greek style.
